Gender and Sexuality through Linguistic Practices in Japanese

Course Description

The field of language, gender, and sexuality is one of the most interdisciplinary areas of study in sociolinguistics. This course explores ideas about gender and sexuality as they emerge through linguistic practice and embodied behavior. Drawing on its interdisciplinary pedigree to provide a broader perspective and set of tools for the study of gender, sexuality and linguistic practice, this course examines: (1) how we evaluate issues of gender inequality in language (how linguistic representations give a clue to the place of women and sexual minority groups); (2) how gender roles play in the structure of human interaction and society; (2) how we analyze various explanations for differential language use among people of diverse genders and sexualities; (3) how the normative ideology of language affects how we perform gender and sexuality; and (4) the historical development of gendered speech from Heian to Reiwa.

Learning Goals:

- 1. Students learn how to examine and evaluate a diverse body of research from anthropology, sociolinguistics, and gender and sexuality studies;
- 2. Students learn to examine various theories of gender, sex and sexuality;
- 3. Students learn to examine some of the ways that gender, sex and sexuality influence language use;
- 4. Students learn how concepts of gender, sex and sexuality are shaped by discourse.
