COURSE DESCRIPTION

Filled with over two thousand temples and shrines, the ancient capital of Kyoto provides the ideal setting for the study of Japanese religions. Temples and shrines, however, are not only sites of faith, but locales where religion, tradition, culture, and tourism intersect. Against this vibrant and complex background accommodating diverse modes of religious practice and sightseeing, this course explores selected aspects of Shinto and Japanese Buddhism in historical as well as contemporary context.

We will examine present-day attitudes to religion, lived by many as inherited tradition, in conjunction with the enormous popularity of the city's temples and shrines that function as promoters of cultural identity and World Heritage tourism. Drawing on the religious landscape of Kyoto and nearby sites, classes will be supplemented with organized fieldtrips, and student assignments will be based both on readings as well as temple/shrine visits and first-hand observance of ceremonies, festivals, and practices.
